Creating a Community Where Every Voice is Heard

We are making very good decision as a group. The kids have decided together how to behave in the community and what it looks like to feel safe and happy. We all agreed that it is important to be nice and respect each other and the environment we share.

We elected the rule "Treat each other with kindness and respect" and agreed it is a great one. We did round to help us decide what respect and kindness look like, sound like, and feel like. Here are some comments from the group:

- Listen to each other.
- Be nice.
- Think about each other's feelings (empathy).
- Think about how your actions affect others.
- Just be nice. Don't be mean just because you disagree with them.
- Be friendly.
- Respect space bubbles.
- Saying please and thank you (manners).
- · Address mistakes with kindness.

In the end, we concluded that the world's problems could be solved if everyone followed this rule.

In another round, we discussed what being responsible looks like:

- Be responsible.
- Keep the toys off the floor.
- Don't litter.
- Pick up your messes.

We then took a stab at finding the right wording for a rule that would include all of those ideas about how we treat the environment. We took words and phrases from the group and molded them into the rule that would be posted on the wall. When we create rules at Children's Choice, we want them to tell us what to do instead of what not to do. So instead of "Don't litter" We might say, "throw your trash in a trash can." They should also be easy to remember and easy to follow and teach the expectations of what is right or wrong.

Oliver, 11: Share the toys. Share, just share.

Facilitator: Share everything? The toys, supplies, that materials, the equipment, even the space?

Oliver: Yes, exactly.

Facilitator: Does that meet all of the criteria that good rules help us not get hurt, be safe, be happy, have fun, get along, be kind and be accountable? Are there any objections? Before we ask for everyone's consent on this rule, does anyone have any changes to the rule, "Share materials, supplies, and space with others?"

Rowan, 6: If you bring something from home, you shouldn't share it because it has germs on it.

Facilitator: So, "Share the Children's Choice supplies, materials, and space with others." Is that OK with you, Rowan and Oliver?

It was, indeed, and the rule was elected by unanimous consent!

Forts

We have been exploring the areas and creating our own activities. One of the more popular activities has been building forts. The kids wanted to create small, private spaces. Daiya, Laken, Lawson and Cruz built a fort out of some poles and connectors. "We can build a room for all of us!" They added drama clothes to cover the top for more privacy. Jasmine and Amelia enjoyed hiding out in their own fort. When they wanted more forts, they used other materials around the environment. We found that the white, plastic cubes connected to create many different patterns.
